A microdeposit that doesn't match, a duplicate payment, a first-time beneficiary, or an unusual amount can reveal it all. Combine that with bulk file encryption and ISO 20022 purpose codes for transaction tagging, and financial institutions start seeing patterns before they become problems. We will cover case studies, research, and actionable strategies. This session explores how curiosity, smart design, and simple vigilance can turn routine processes into a powerful fraud defense.
